In July we learned about quilting with our walking feet (or is it foots?) with **Catherine Redford** from Illinois. **Katalin Horvath** from Dorest, UK created new designs just for our guild's Draw, Sew, Trim August 14th workshop. The Zoom workshops continue to be highly regarded by participating members!

Members also expressed a desire for social activities in the survey. So, we created a schedule of "Sit 'N Sews" where members get together virtually to chat, sew, and catch up with old and new friends.

September 9th Guild meeting- Linda Pearl (Zoom)

"But I Didn't Mean To Break the Rules ..." a lighthearted, interactive look at a very serious subject – copyright issues. Copyright issues are very much at the epicenter of quilting

trends today, and lots of times tempers flare. Linda will take several common scenarios (drawn from real life events), and break them down into easy to understand, easier still to remember, rules of the game. Linda will have scripts as we learn how to respect the intellectual property of others.

Saturday, September 11th; 9:00 – 12:00, Linda will present a morning workshop called, "**The Devil Is In The Details**." This is a FUN, FUNctional and FUNdamental approach to

binding your quilts. Binding is one of the last details you put into finishing your quilt and it's one that, in Linda's experience, quilters dislike the most. In this class, Linda will cover flange bindings, two color bindings, striped bindings and invisible bindings. \$32.00 for members/\$40.00 for guests.

October 7th; Bonnie Turner, Log Cabin Quilts, will present a lecture on embellishing quilts. We'll share more information as the date approaches. There will be no workshop October,

November or December, in order to accommodate other traditional guild events.

HELP WANTED! QUILTS NEEDED!

For over 30 years our guild has been giving quilts to Northern Rivers Family Services (formerly Northeast Parent & Child). We were able to give them 170 quilts during the pandemic (since March 2019), BUT 84% of them were made by two people! I am hoping to increase participation! The children "love our quilts!" It would be a shame if our donation dropped substantially. It is my hope that more members will make and complete quilts at home this year.

Secondly, I will not be attending any in-person meetings this guild year. I would like volunteers (who WILL be attending meetings) to take a bag of kits to a meeting, have people sign them out, and collect FINISHED quilts. It would also be great to have someone(s) in a central location do the same from their home or business, for those who do not attend meetings. If you are interested in doing either of these things, please contact either me or Lisa Wend, our president. I have plenty of kits made up to give you.

Finished quilts should be either tied or machine quilted and at

least 54" x 72". Teen boy quilts are always most in demand please remember no pinks or florals on either side of a quilt for boys! Also, if you are tying your quilt, please be sure follow the batting package instructions for knot spacing.



Q.U.I.L.T.S. Survey Results Available

Two surveys were conducted last spring in order to get feedback on various subjects and for the board to be able to plan for the future in an informed manner. Participation was very high with over 63% of guild members responding, more than double the typically expected survey response. The answers to the survey questions, the first set on the guild in general and the second on programs, helped us learn about who are we, how we communicate and participate, and what our meeting and workshop preferences are. The Notions Department

Welcome to the first edition of The Notions Department where we'll draw on hundreds of years of Q.U.I.L.T.S.'s members' experience!

Have you ever had a quilting disaster? How did you handle it?

Making a quilt using 8 1/2 "squares along with square-in-a-square blocks. The color of the plain block was a deep purple with threadlike lines. I cut one side of many of these plain squares to 8". This was the end of that particular fabric, so I had to improvise. In my stash, I found a similar fabric in a dark brown. The color value of the brown was very close to the purple, so I used it, scattered throughout. No one noticed. They just thought it was part of the design. Disaster diverted! – *Pat McGurn*

When printing block designs from Jinny Beyer, I did not print them 100%. I completed every block before realizing that the lattice sashing didn't fit. I added a border to every block. After quilting, the mistake was not noticeable. • *Eileen Buel*

My worst quilting disaster was when I was well along piecing a quilt and discovered there was an error in the instructions between light and dark piece placement. I was a novice quilter and trusted the directions to be correct. The whole mess ended up in my UFO collection. - *Elaine McCain*

After putting a quilt top together, I noticed two of the blocks were pieced wrong. I left it that way because I was afraid I would ruin it more taking it apart. I don't

think the person I gave it to noticed it and I certainly didn't say anything! Also, I have had to piece together different fabrics for backings unintentionally because I ran out of fabric. - Sharon Nicpon

My quilting disaster occurred when I tried to assemble my first "quilt as you go" blocks. My sashing was all cut on the crosswise grain, which I discovered only carefully measuring and inserting blocks at each intersection. I had to take out my little blocks, re-measure each piece with a firm stretch then sew in the block and continue like that for each of 24 blocks. I had to accept that the quilt would have these imperfections, but after all that work I am okay with how it turned out. You may be sure that in the future my sashing strips will be carefully cut on the lengthwise grain! - Lucinda Robertson

So far, "disasters" have been on the minor and boring side, such as quilting a motif wrong or cutting a patchwork piece reversed. I just cuss a bit and do it over. - *Kim Plofker*

Usually not having right sided together (often!) - *Eileen McCabe*

The one quilting disaster I had was when I was clipping threads on a quilt for the show, and I clipped the fabric! It was black so I took a magic marker and just hit it quick with that! - Barb Valachovic
