Hello Again, Friends!

It's hard to believe this is the Spring edition of our newsletter when we're still in the depths of winter. It feels like only yesterday that I was contemplating the New Year's resolutions that I wouldn't keep, or even bother to make. Now, I must start thinking about the garden I probably won't plant! Yes, Lisa is a procrastinator.



In the first days of 2022 I happened upon a 21-day Sewing Room Declutter Challenge on Karen Brown's Just Get it Done Quilts YouTube channel. For some of us (or maybe just me) decluttering can be an

overwhelming task. Karen breaks the challenge down into 15-minute per day tasks, which for most is quite do-able, but I will need 15 hours a day, so I think I'll wait until I retire. I did at least decide to dive into one part of her challenge...that being Day 17 "scrap management". This involved collecting ALL my scraps and piling them up to see just how much I had. I'm not exaggerating when I say I spent every day of the last 4 weeks gathering, ironing, and trimming it all. Ever since I was a kid, I loved to sort things in different ways...by size, by color, by type. My mother never knew how her pantry was going to be organized from one day to the next. It makes sense that I spent much of my career as a data manager/analyst. So, sorting these scraps was familiar and comfortable for me and it made me feel happy to be so productive. After sorting out my larger scraps (anything larger than 2.5"), I decided to do something with my "crumbs". The little photos you see here are just a few of the 15 ½" blocks I made with bits of fabric most sane quilters would stuff inside a pet bed. Oh, don't worry, I have 2 trash bags full of trimmings



for that purpose. The process is not unlike how I take a dataset apart, cut out the unusable records, decide how to arrange the rest, then put it together in a way that tells a story. I'll sew these blocks into a quilt that will represent my 36-year career that is coming to an end in August. Retirement is one thing I will not put off!

What stories do your quilts tell? I would love to hear them.

This Spring we have two sew-ins/tie-ins scheduled and two in-person events being planned. Also, we are fortunate to have two more wonderful lecturers offering us presentations and workshops. Think of



how a new skill could help you express yourself in your quilting. If you've wanted to learn something new and have fun doing it, what are you waiting for? Don't be a Lisa.

ARTICLE II- PURPOSE - The purpose of this group shall be to learn about quilting, to promote the knowledge and understanding of all aspects of the art of quiltmaking, to share quilting information and education with its members and the community.

The Q.U.I.L.T.S. Program Committee's Mary Wade continues to work towards the guild's stated purpose while arranging lectures and workshops on topics and techniques that our guild members have expressed interest in. In January, we practiced our free motion quilting skills while learning about dimensional thread painting with Joyce Hughes of Pennsylvania. Participants embellished fabric panels, created from a photograph of Joyce's garden, with a variety of stitching techniques and thread types. In February, we went tiny with Kellie Willey who guided us through the fun process of making "wonky" log cabin block quilts in miniature from her studio in Sacramento, California and in her guild, lecture shared the wide variety of mini quilts she has created. (Examples of members' projects are shared on the guild's Facebook page following each workshop.)



We have two educational programs remaining this year. On April 7th Susan Cleveland's guild lecture will be called, "My Electric Quilt Pageant" where she will share "a plethora of tips to increase accuracy and add fresh, interesting

details with piping, prairie points, heavy

threads, and embellishments." On Saturday, April 9th, her workshop will be on the Disappearing Dresden pattern where double points put a contemporary spin on this old favorite and eliminate the need for the traditional appliquéd circle in the center. There will be a variety of patterns, books, and tools on offer for this class so the registration deadline will be in mid-March. A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE KIDS' QUILT PROGRAM

Did you know that our Kids' Quilt Program is actually called "Straight From the Heart?" When our guild was founded in the 1980s, the founding members wanted to do something for the community. Northeast Parent and Child was selected as the beneficiary of quilts made by the guild. Ten years ago, Northeast and Parsons Family Center joined together to form Northern Rivers Family of Services. Q.U.I.L.T.S. has continued to support the

neglected, abused, and children in need of other services for 32 years, donating a total of 2836 quilts over those years. 86 of those have been donated this guild year so far.

Incidentally, our Straight From the Heart program is not the same as the national organization, "Quilts for Kids," despite what we usually call it!

Thank you to everyone who has supported the program over the years. The children love the quilts. Many of them have never had anything of their very own, and certainly nothing so lovely that was handmade for them. They treasure the quilts.

Keep on quilting! Kits for tops are available from the usual volunteers, or you can make your own twin size quilt from your own stash. Until we can regularly meet in person, I am accepting only completed quilts.

Challenge for our June Guild Meeting and Ouilt Show


This challenge was originally introduced towards the end of 2020, but with all the uncertainties we faced, it never got off the ground. This challenge will serve as our end-of-the-guild-year (June) challenge and for our upcoming show challenge which is tentatively scheduled for October 8th & 9th, 2022. You can enter your quilt in either the June or the show challenge, or both.

The challenge is "Color Me Happy" and based on an idea ("Visual Coloring") given to us by Joan Wolfrom, our October 2020 speaker. You are to select a photograph that makes you happy and make a wall hanging or table topper of your own creation using ONLY the colors in the photo. You may use any block or design of your choosing and the piece must measure no more than 160" in perimeter. The photograph must accompany the piece. Also, a 4" hanging sleeve is required, especially if you intend to enter this piece in the show. These pieces will be displayed at our June meeting and voted on by the guild members in attendance. They will also be displayed as a group at our next quilt show and will be voted on by the show attendees. There will be a separate quilt show registration form for these pieces. More information regarding the quilt show will be announced after the committee meets in April.
