During 2021 – 2022, Q.U.I.L.T.S. offered lectures and workshops to our members featuring presenters from across the country who shared many different quilting techniques and styles. Participation in the virtual format remained consistent from last year to this one, with almost 70% of last year's participants returning for workshops this year, and almost 30% of the participants being first timers.

As reported at the May guild meeting, plans for the 2022 - 2023 year are underway with the calendar being reviewed. There are some questions to consider, including whether to have summer workshops, and the concept of having stand-alone workshops for months with sew-ins or ties-ins. The big question is what format will be used for workshops next year, again, with questions to be answered. Feedback, from virtual workshop

attendees, has been extremely positive for the many reasons that have been shared with you in the past. How do we maintain accessibility for all our members, both physically and technologically? How would going back to in person workshops impact our budget? And our presenter options? What are their comfort levels with traveling and in person events? What are our members' comfort levels? Will there be facility limitations? In the next couple of weeks, we will be sending out another brief survey to the Q.U.I.L.T.S. membership to get your feedback on some of these questions to assist us in creating another series of programs that will fulfill our guild's primary purpose - educating our members. Linda Tripoli and *Maggie Katz* have generously stepped forward to run the Kids' Quilt Program. I'm sure they will do a great job and bring exciting new ideas to the program!

Veterans' Quilts

Q.U.I.L.T.S. Supports Veterans

In 2003, Q.U.I.L.T.S. Guild of Schenectady became involved with a guild in southern Maryland which distributed quilts to injured soldiers returning from Iraq and Afghanistan. *Helen Trinci* chaired the project at this time until she resigned due to health reasons in 2005 when I stepped in to continue our Guild's involvement. Quilts were brought to the soldiers at the Bethesda Naval Hospital and Andrews Air Force Base.

In 2009, John Bena, son of guild member, Lois Bena, was a video journalist with CNN and submitted his idea to follow a quiltmade by Christina Powell, from its beginning to its delivery to an injured soldier. It was accepted and was featured in their Thankfulness program shown on Christmas Day, 2009. A video of this project has been available on the Guild website, "quilts on CNN". Before this effort was disbanded in 2012, when American forces were withdrawn from Iraq, our guild contributed over 200 quilts to this project. Our focus then turned to the Stratton VA Hospital in Albany, NY. A welcome packet, including a quilt or an afghan, was given to each veteran admitted overnight to the hospital. (Other groups also contributed quilts and knitted afghans.) Two or three guild members went to the VA Hospital about six times each year to pass out the welcome packets and our quilts to the patients. The recipients were

always very grateful for our thanks for their service and for the quilts. We passed out over five hundred quilts made by guild members from 2012 to February 2020. The pandemic shut this and all voluntary services down at the hospital.

As there were no in-person visits allowed in the hospital, we investigated if there were other means to distribute quilts to the patients. We spoke with the manager of voluntary services, and he presented the idea of giving quilts to families of in patients who use the Fisher House on the VA campus. This facility is very similar to the Ronald McDonald House concept where veteran families from out of town can stay while their family member is in the hospital. It is also used by veterans, who live away and need daily treatment. Quilts are given to the family member and then passed on to the veteran. In September 2021, we brought out first supply of quilts. They were very well received, and the recipients were heartily grateful and surprised they could take a quilt home. As of March 2022, 55 quilts have been distributed in this manner. Attached to each quilt is the label from its maker, a tag with Guild thank you and contact information, anda star from a USA flag. Although it is not the same as actually handing a quilt to a veteran, we feel it is a good way to thank a veteran for his/her service to our country.

Challenge for our June Guild Meeting and Quilt Show

This challenge was originally introduced towards the end of 2020, but with all the uncertainties we faced, it never got off the ground. This challenge will serve as our end-of-the-guild-year (June) challenge and for our upcoming show challenge which is scheduled for October 8th & 9th, 2022. You can enter your quilt in either the June or the show challenge, or both.

The challenge is "Color Me Happy" and based on an idea ("Visual Coloring") given to us by Joan Wolfrom, our October 2020 speaker. You are to select a photograph that makes you happy and make a wall hanging or table topper of your own creation using ONLY the colors in the photo. You may use any block or design of your choosing and the piece must measure no more than 160" in perimeter. The photograph must accompany the piece. Also, a 4" hanging sleeve is required, especially if you intend to enter this piece in the show. These pieces will be displayed at our June meeting and voted on by the guild members in attendance. They will also be displayed as a group at our next quilt show and will be voted on by the show attendees.




