THE PROGRAM COMMITTEE

It's time to "rule" and do some patchwork!

Hello workshoppers! Our **January** and **March** guild meetings and workshops will be virtual. Here's what we'll be doing from our warm, cozy sewing areas.

In January we will be joined from Mobile, Alabama, by Nina Clotfelter. Her Thursday, **January 5th**, lecture is called, "**Threads – What's the BIG Deal?**" This is a FUN lecture on all the things you didn't know you needed to know about threads.

Her Saturday, January 7th, workshop will be "Beginning Ruler Work." We'll learn how to hold and

work with rulers on our domestic machines. Nina says that this is a great way to enhance our free motion quilting skills. By the end of class, we will have successfully used the ruler and created a block with it. The fee for members for Nina's 6-hour workshop will be \$55.00 and the supply list \$50.00. A 9:00 AM start time is being confirmed. Annette's workshop will begin at 10:00 AM from the comfort of your sewing room and finish up at 4:00 PM. The cost for members will be \$50.00. As we learn Annette's curved piecing technique, we will make a Carolina Dogwood wallhanging with three blooms and five leaves.

KIDS' QUILTS FOR NORTHERN RIVERS

For our new members, the Straight From the Heart, Quilts for Kids program has been making quilts for foster children supported through Northern Rivers Family Services since 1989. To date, the guild has donated 2750 quilts. This year we have donated a total of 228 quilts, 119 of which were created by the newly retired program coordinator and her small team. This is the most ever donated in a year, thank you for all your hard work!

On November 3rd the guild held its annual Sew-In to create new quilt tops for the program. A little more than 50 people attended who sewed, tied, cut or ironed fabric, blocks and quilts. Thank you to all who attended and to Latefa and Kathy L. for the pizza and soda, and to those who brought desserts, everything was delicious! Our annual Tie-In, where we will tie quilt tops that have been created, will be held February 2, 2023. We look forward to seeing you all there. We may also hold another event prior to that, stay tuned!

Northern Rivers have advised us that they have access to online auction software. This could be used by the guild as a fundraising tool, either to have donations made directly to Northern Rivers or to the guild to purchase supplies to support the program. Members can donate quilts, wall hangings, table runners, etc they have created that they aren't planning to use for auction on the site. Please contact Maggie or Linda for more information should you have an item you wish to have auctioned off.

As a reminder, we are creating quilts predominately for *adolescents*. Currently there are as many boys as girls in the program, but that fluctuates so please try to choose fabrics that are as gender neutral as possible. Finished quilts should measure **54**" **x 72**".

And again, the program has recently received significant donations of fabric for which we are thankful, but we are currently at critical mass and cannot accept any more. As we create more kits and use up some of our stash, we will advise you once we feel we can again accept donations.

During the pandemic we had guild members who volunteered to be pick up points for quilt kits and for dropping off quilt tops or finished quilts. Now that we are meeting in person, we will once again centralize the kit pick up and quilt drop off to occur during monthly guild meetings. This may change should circumstances change, and we will alert you in that event. Thank you to Connie, Deb K., Felicia and Patti A. for being our wonderful volunteers!

VETERANS' QUILTS

November 4th was the date of our first post pandemic Veteran Quilts sew-in and I am pleased to report that it was a big success. Twelve sewers assembled quilts, using both our and their own kits; some were able to start on a second top as well. In addition, three helpers assisted with ironing, cutting, etc. and also tied two quilts. A very productive day!



The photo shows the delivery of thirty quilts to the VA Hospital on November 8th. We were pleased we were able to do this. These quilts will be distributed to both the Stratton Inn unit in the hospital and to veterans on November 11th, Veterans Day. Mike Fitzpatrick, Voluntary Services manager, at the VA suggested this would be another means to give veterans a quilt on this special day.

You may have seen in the paper that a home was recently reopened in Ballston Spa for women veterans who are transitioning from difficult times including homelessness to independent living. At a member's suggestion, I made contact with the

resident assistant there to see if there would be a need for quilts. She was delighted that residents could be given their own quilt to take with them when they move on to independent living. Final arrangements for this still have to made, but we will be pleased to be able to help these women as they make a new start in their lives.

Talking about "final", I have decided that it is time for me to pass this project on to another person in the Guild. Veterans Quilts has been a big part of my life for over ten years, and it is in a good place. Guild participation and support has been over the top. That pandemic did not deter you and quilts and kits kept passing, often on our front porch. I will, of course, remain an active member of the Guild, but it will be in a more passive role.

Thanks to all of you; it is you who have made this project so successful. A special thanks to my friendship group, the Chatties, who have done so much to help with everything. They always came through with what was needed to be done. Over 800 quilts have been given to vets over these past ten years. Kudos to you!

For our Guild's Challenge, "Color be Happy", Linda Cary took 1st place with "Color me Orange" and Barbara Valachovic took 2nd place with "Color Me Happy In the Adirondacks".


- 35-bed Women and Children's Shelter

AuthorMichael Sirois wrote a two-book series called *If a Butterfly* that he thinks our guild members might find interesting.

Michael writes...

One of the primary characters in the books, Stella Lambert, is a recently widowed quilter who has moved to a state halfway across the country. She had often visited there on vacation with her husband, so she remembered the area fondly. She had a reputation as a good quilter back home, but no one knows anything about her in her new location. Starting over is hard, but she's determined to succeed.

In the story, a Monarch butterfly, during its annual migration from Canada to Mexico, interacts with several of the characters. When that happens, their lives become intertwined. I've been describing the story as something like Six Degrees of Separation from Kevin Bacon (if Kevin just happened to be a butterfly). A number of scenes in the series take place in New York State and other parts of New England and Ontario.
