Dear Friends.

President: (2-year term, elected) Presides over all meetings and coordinates the activities of the organization. Appoints committee heads. Establishes ad-hoc committees as needed. Represents or appoints a representative to any organization which is of interest to Q.U.I.L.T.S. Shall be an exofficio member of all standing committees. Has the authority to sign or disburse necessary appropriations in absence of the Treasurer and maintains the second key to the post office box

Vice President: (2-year term, elected) Assumes the power of the President in his/her absence. Shall take on special assignments as requested by the President. Shall negotiate lease and reserve the meeting places plus take care of any special needs which may arise regarding meeting places. Coordinates with the Hospitality Committee and Program Committee as needed. Maintains the guild bylaws with assistance from the other Officers. Shall maintain a listing of all guild equipment and its physical location.

Veteran's Quilt Coordinator: (Best for 2-3 people) Coordinate all aspects of the guild's donations to the Veteran Quilts program. This includes handling donations made to the program and coordinating the collection and delivery of quilts and tracking the number of quilts that are turned in. A change in the recipient agency requires guild approval.

Fat Quarter Raffle Chair: Determines theme for monthly fat quarter drawing. Notifies newsletter chair and webmaster so that themes can be published timely. Coordinates drawing at monthly guild meetings.

Block of the Month Chair: Designs and drafts Block-of-the-Month, purchases fabric, makes packets and a sample block for meetings. Sells new packets. Collects completed blocks from the previous month and holds a raffle. Keeps a written record of expenses and receipts.

Hospitality Chair: (Need 1-2 helpers) Arrange for refreshments and related supplies to be at each meeting. Announces whose turn it is to bring in refreshments as needed. Is responsible for Holiday Party and End-of-the Year Party.

2024 Quilt Show Chair: Oversees the planning coordination and execution of the biennial quilt show.

Librarian: Shall oversee the library and resource center. Maintains and oversees the lending of the library contents at each meeting according to established guidelines. Keeps a current listing of library contents and purchases new additions.

Historian: Collects and protects our history as a quilt group. Writes a summary of our year and who the speakers were, special events, etc. Takes pictures of Show and Tell quilts and other meeting highlights and enters them into Guild scrapbook. Also provides copies of pictures to the Webmaster for uploading to the website.



THE PROGRAM COMMITTEE

Here's a look ahead at the guild's spring offerings:

March 2023 - Virtual



Annette Ornelas of Southwind Designs will be joining us for our March guild meeting and workshop, both virtual. The topic of her March 2nd lecture will be her dimensional curved piecing technique, also known as "Peeled-Back Patchwork." This is an easy layering technique which makes lovely dimensional curves. It is like Straight Line Piecing with Curved Results!

The resulting bias edges of folded squares or strips are turned or folded back, smoothed down into a curvy shape. This curved edge is then secured by top-stitching close to the original fold. It is fast and easy and results in blocks that look complex yet are easy to piece.

At our Saturday, March 4th workshop we will use this technique to make Carolina Dogwood blocks, and each decide whether we want to use them for a wall hanging, bed scarf or quilt. The workshop will run from 10:00 AM – 4:00 PM. The workshop fee for members will be \$50 and for guests \$55. The required \$10 pattern PDF will be ordered using a special link to Annette's website and be paid for at the same time as the workshop fee.

April 2023 – In Person

Linda Warren will join us in person as our presenter and workshop teacher in April. (Linda did a workshop with us in October 2019 where we made "Over The Moon" blocks using her Learning Curve Tool.)

Her lecture at our April 13th guild meeting will be on successful fabric selection for more dynamic quilts. On her website Linda says: We all know the trick of choosing a "focus fabric" and selecting coordinating fabrics that match the colors in the focus fabric. As Dr Phil says, "How's that workin' for ya?" It works fine for a pattern calling for 3 or 4 fabrics, but what if you want to make a quilt with fat quarters or scraps? What if



you want your quilt to look more dimensional? This lecture includes many practical pearls you can take home and use to take your quilts to the next level. The examples of quilt projects that Linda will share will include some made with her Learning Curve Tool.

April's workshop will be on Friday, April 14th, from 9:30 – 4:00, including a 30-minute lunch break. We will use the Learning Curve Tool to make blocks for the Circle In a Square quilt, finishing it outside of class. The fee will be \$45 for members and \$50 for guests. You will be able to purchase the Learning Curve Tool for \$15.95 at the guild meeting or the day of the workshop.

It is believed that Linda's workshop in 2019 was the last one held in person before the lock down. How appropriate that she will lead our first in person workshop since that time! May 2023

STRAIGHT FROM THE HEART QUILTS FOR KIDS

On February 2nd the guild held its annual tie-in to tie quilt tops that had been created by our members. Fifty-two people attended who pressed and tied the various tops that were supplied. All the tops supplied were subsequently taken home by members to trim & bind. In addition, several members brought their own tops with backing to tie so the exact number of quilts tied will not be known until they are all returned. Thanks to those members who graciously took quilt tops home to trim & bind, and thanks to members who took home tops that had been paired with backs & batting that were not tied. In the future we plan to have kits containing completed tops, backing & batting for members to take home either to tie or machine quilt (for all those members who like to practice their long arm skills!) in addition to the quilt kits we usually have on hand.

Thank you to all who attended the tie-in and to Latefa & Kathy L. for the wonderful selection of pizza, homemade salad, and soda, and to those members who provided delicious deserts, everything was much appreciated!

We also want to thank Chris Powell, who has served as the guild's tying guru for many years, & for her guidance & management of the demonstration table at the tie-in which helped guild

members refresh their tying skills. This was Chris' last tie-in & she will be missed in that role.

On March 3rd, from 9 am to 3 pm, we will be hosting a cutting party in the smaller room at the church. We plan on further cutting existing kits that either require extensive cutting or additional cutting to assist members when they take kits. That room will accommodate 12 people so please let Maggie or I know if you would like to participate. We will provide drinks, snacks & desert but you will need to bring your own lunch. At some point we will be hosting a larger cutting party to create new kits so stay tuned!

As a reminder, we are creating quilts predominately for *adolescents*. Currently there are as many boys as girls in the program, but that fluctuates so please try to choose fabrics that are as gender neutral as possible. Finished quilts should measure **54**" **x 72**".

And again, the program has recently received significant donations of fabric for which we are thankful, but we are currently at critical mass and cannot accept any more. As we create more kits and use up some of our stash, we will advise you once we feel we can again accept donations.
